

of Country taken collectively would form
a good agricultural Settlement. - It
is watered by several fine streams,
running through it about a mile apart
from each other and it is skirted in
various places by lofty pine trees, and
other timber. - When we had walked
nearly 10 miles we entered a very fine
wood in which there were some of the
largest pines I had ever seen. One
measured more than thirty feet in girth,
and probably not less than one hundred
feet in height, without a branch, it
appeared to be nearly the same
thickness at the top as at the bottom.

While passing thro' this wood, we
met with a Chief's wife who was
overjoyed to see us; her husband's name
was Terria a very fine handsome
looking man, he had been on board
the Brig a few days before; he informed
me that some time back, a boat's crew
belonging to a whaler had entered his
potatoe ground, in the Bay of Island,
to steal his potatoes, and that he had
set his father and some of his people
to watch them, when the europeans shot
his father dead, and killed another man
and a woman, he afterwards watched them
himself, and killed three European sailors. -
